Chapter E Couple Spotlight

BOB and THESS THURGOOD

Thess Thurgood was born in Espana, Manila, Philippines in 1946. She graduated from high school and completed a year of college at Feati University in Manila. She married and had five children – two boys and three girls. She and her husband separated in 1984 and she went to work in Singapore, having to leave her kids behind in the care of her mother-in-law. After her father passed away while she was in Singapore she decided to join one of the popular pen-pal clubs advertised in the newspaper there. She did so and wrote to several gentlemen in the United States. Guess who one of them was. Thess became a member of the Mormon Church while in Singapore, subsequently returning to the Philippines to her kids. She brought them with her to the USA in June of 1988. By that time Guess Who had visited her in Singapore and in the Philippines four times, and she had accepted his ardent proposal of marriage. In fact, she came here on what is called a "fiancé visa," which allowed all her kids to come with her. Her first "real" date with Bob was a Church "Boat Dance" Friday evening, July 1, 1988, on Lake Washington. It was such a nice date that they decided to get married the next day. They were married in the LDS Temple in south Bellevue July 2, 1988. Bob always did like boats! That one turned out pretty well, n'est-ce pas?

Bob Thurgood was born in Salt Lake City in 1937, the eldest of ten children. He started playing the violin in the 4th grade, switching to the larger viola in high school. He graduated from South High School in 1955 and attended BYU for one quarter in 1956, than served his LDS Mission in the Eastern United States from 1957 to 1959. He married and they eventually adopted two children – a boy and a girl. He obtained a Teacher's Certificate and graduated from the University of Utah in 1966, and after continuing in graduate courses for a couple years began teaching music in the Castro Valley, California School system. An infamous tax levy failure there eliminated his position, and they came to Washington in 1969, where he taught music in the Shoreline School District. Another tax levy failure in 1971 eliminated his job again and he left public school teaching as a business. He has been self-employed as a piano technician-tuner for 26 years, and will stay at that employment until he can find something more permanent. When he became separated from his wife in 1985, he joined the same pen-pal club that Thess happened to belong to and the rest is history, to the tune of 8 grandchildren.

Bob's first ride was on a Harley Davidson in about 1955 on a friend's bike at his friend's insistence. His first bike was the famous Honda 50cc two-tone blue and grey little "step-through" scooter, on which he accidentally performed his first magnificent wheelie – about 100 feet across State Street because he hit the throttle when it was in neutral, and popped it into gear at about 10,000 rpm. That blasted front wheel just WOULD'N'T come down! Their first Goldwing, a 99 1500 SE was bought from a private party in Prescott, AZ in October 2002. They have decided to "trike" it, and expect the conversion to be completed somewhere around Christmas time. They have been WA E Chapter, WA District and Region I COY, and will journey to Nashville TN in July 2006 to take part in the International COY selection events.

They want the impossible—those mean little brats


I spent a whole year making wagons and sleds

They want computers and robots...they think - I'm IBM!


Flying through the air...dodging the trees

White Chocolate Cherry Chunkies

Prep Time: 15 min. Yield: 4 dozen cookies

1 cup butter, softened
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
2 large eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup chopped macadamia nuts
½ cup candied cherries
1 ½ cups white chocolate chunks

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. In a medium bowl, with electric mixer, cream butter and sugars together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and beat until just combined. Set aside. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add milk to the butter mixture and then add the flour mixture. Mix until just combined. In another bowl, combine nuts, cherries and white chocolate. Then add to batter, stirring only to blend. Drop by heaping tablespoons onto a grease cookie sheet, 2 inches apart. Bake for approximately 11 to 13 minutes. Cool on wire rack.

Rider Education

Winters in the Northwest are Tricky

Winters here in the Northwest can be very tricky for motorcyclists, so let's all be extra careful to make sure we make it through safely. Most of us are pretty good about layering up in the winter months, and we know that if we get wet that it amplifies the effects of the cold, so we need to be even more careful. We have had articles in the past about the effects of hypothermia and how dangerous it can be, especially to the motorcyclist because one of the effects is to slow your reaction time and dull your senses. On a motorcycle, we need all the reaction time and sharpness of senses that we can get. And one of the tricks of Northwest Winters is to shine the sun making it appear to be warm, possibly even feeling warm while you're standing still, only to discover that it's much colder when you're moving.

Remember that just because you feel warm does not mean that the ground is warm or that your tires are warm. When you begin your ride, your tires will be cold and won't grip the road nearly as well as they do when they are warm. So be sure to account for this decrease in traction when you're making your turns.

Temperatures vary dramatically from place to place or even just from sunshine to shade. You may think that because the news says that the temperature is 40 degrees, it means that you won't face ice, but that's not necessarily true. First of all, you should ask yourself where that temperature reading was taken. The local Seattle news stations' broadcasts reach up into Canada, down to Portland, out to the ocean and up into the mountains. So just where was that temperature reading taken, and where will you be riding? As long as we're on that subject, have you noticed that the "current temperature" reading varies by several degrees, even among cities that are side-by-side?

Next, ask yourself whether all of the roads you will be riding on have been receiving direct sunlight all day. Will there be patches of shade where ice or frost could be hiding? What about minor hills and valleys? Ever been riding north up I-5 just past Everett on a cool autumn evening and felt that sudden chill as you pass through the cold zone? What happens if you do that when the temperature is hovering within a few degrees of freezing? And what about that bridge you have to cross that is exposed all around, and more likely to have ice or frost than the regular pavement on either side?

And another of my favorites is how fast the temperature changes when the sun goes down. Do you know what time sunset is and how that relates to your trip? You may be warm enough during the day, but will you be warm enough at night? Do you have one part of you that always seems to feel the cold regardless of what else you are wearing? It's time to address that and get the gear you need. Cold fingers will really hinder your ability to stop or swerve in an emergency, and that could be your undoing. Other cold parts are a distraction at the least, and possibly more dangerous than that.

By now, you may think I'm completely against riding in the winter months. I'm not. I especially enjoy a ride on a sunny clear-blue-sky day after weeks of rain or gray blah. I just want you to think through the things that you don't have to even consider in the summer time. You see, I want you to keep coming back and sharing the adventure with all of us. Ride Safe so you can ride longer!


